Fruit and Vegetable Benefit: Congress enhanced WIC's fruit and vegetable benefit to align with scientific recommendations. Current monthly benefit amounts are \$26 for children, \$47 for pregnant and postpartum participants, and \$52 for breastfeeding participants. In FY 2023, WIC provided an estimated **\$11.9M** in fruit and vegetable benefits to **31,507** participants in Utah.

CHILDHOOD OBESITY IN WIC IN UTAH

The obesity rate among WIC toddlers in Utah decreased **34** percent between 2010 and 2020.
